

Franciscan Peace in a time of War

Love, Pardon, Joy, Hope, and Serenity.¹ These are our rule. How do we hold them up against violence and retribution? I know we are all praying in response to the situation in the Middle East. Listen:

Discern:

Statements have rightly been called insufficient, but we need to remember, the Church hierarchy has a teaching role. Official statements help to clarify its position. The laity is to implement, to "renew the temporal order... infuse a Christian spirit.^{2"} So for us, statements by the hierarchy are useful guides for public action, which we are to take "without waiting for orders and directives.^{3"} This relationship was described by Pope Paul VI in *Popularum Progressio* in 1967, and is reflected directly in our Rule, and our General Constitutions:

"Secular Franciscans are called to make their own contribution, inspired by the person and message of Saint Francis of Assisi, towards a civilization in which the dignity of the human person, shared responsibility, and love may be living realities⁴"

Go Forth:

We have one mission, to be the face of Christ to all we meet, and in every situation. But we have many ministries. We take action according to our gifts and temperaments. We are to act courageously for justice, and always in the context of *loving dialogue*. We listen to and try to understand those who disagree. We model this. It is how we speak with detractors at public events, or coworkers, or family

members at a holiday gathering or a fraternity meeting. It is how we shape our letters to the editor, or to politicians. It is how we interact on social media. It is what we bring to the table as OFS members. When any person has interacted in disagreement with a secular Franciscan, that person should walk away feeling respected and heard, and hopefully with a willingness for more conversation. Whatever we do for Justice and peace and the integrity of creation is beautiful, useful, and good. *How* we do it is central. It is who we are.

One thing many of us can do about the war is to donate:

- The mass shooting in Lewiston, Maine was not far down the road from where we live. We lost a parishioner, Stephen Vozzella. Our fraternity minister, Sandra Thompson, lost a friend and coworker, Lucy Violette. Thanks for the prayers. - The COP28 (annual climate meeting) is this month. Pope Francis is to attend in person. The Holy Father, and Our sister Mother Earth are counting on us to meet the challenge of the environmental crisis. The Catholic Climate Covenant sponsored a series of discussions this summer entitled: Laudato Si' and the U.S. Catholic Church.
