

## Patterns and Plans for Re-enacting Francis First Christmas Crèche with Christmas Eve Prayer Service

At his first Christmas nativity, Francis had only an ox, an ass, a small manger with hay, friars, his brothers, and the town's people with candles and torches and lanterns.

It took me a few months, intermittently working on this project, to figure out how to make all these little props. So, all the patterns and directions are here for you so that you will have a guide. Now, you can use them or change them up however best for you.

This will help you make all the things needed, and in doing so, hopefully (as Francis hoped for the town's people of his time) a profound awakening to the Christ Child will come upon you. I promise everyone will remember the First Christmas Crèche after this.

Materials and patterns:

To make the donkey ears: pg 2

For the brothers and rest of the towns people: white candles

### To make donkey ears:

A headband – get a thick one  
2 sheets of Tan copy paper – letter size  
2 sheets of brown felt – letter size  
Elmer's glue  
Thread and needle

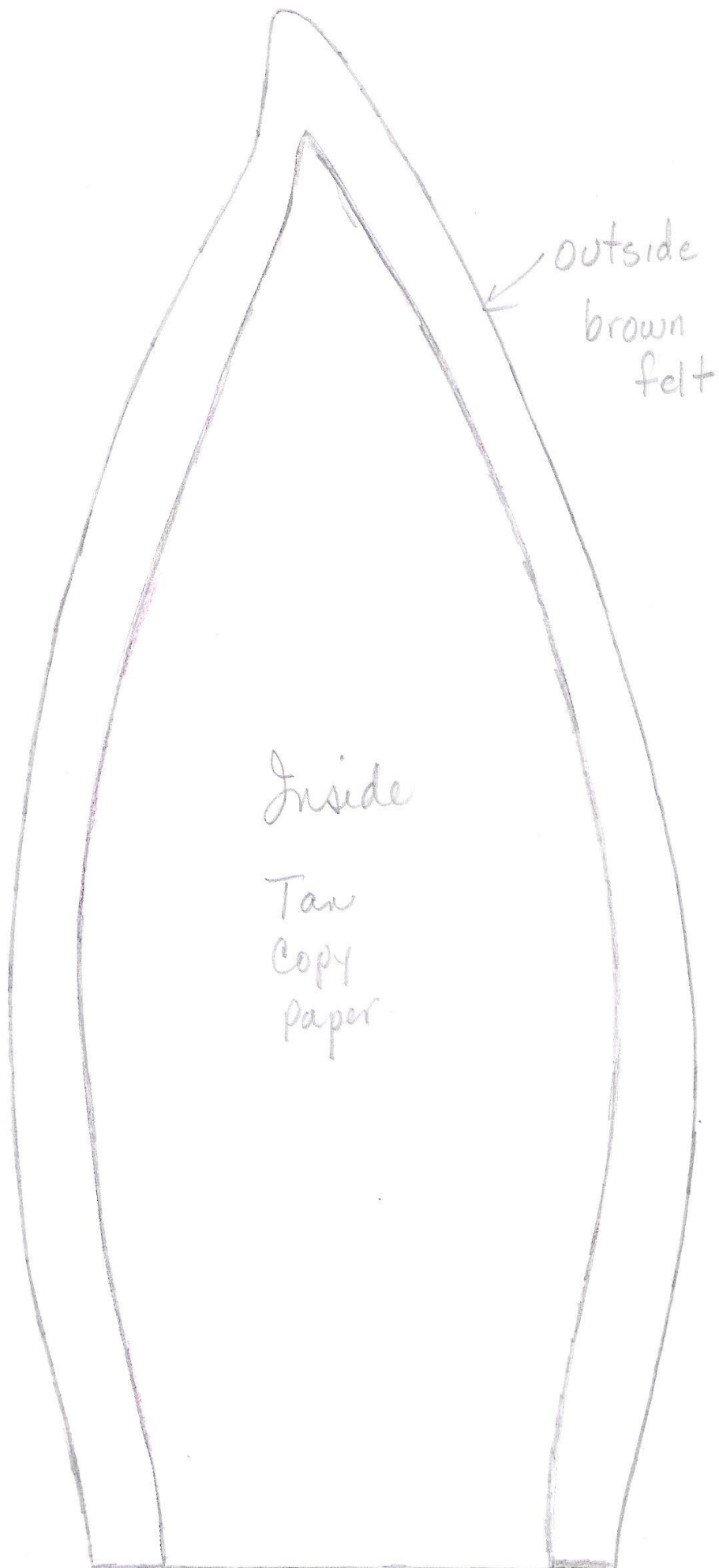
Patterns are on the next pages. Outside and inside patterns are in one text box on page 3 because it was difficult to be sure the sizes would match right when coping into two different text boxes. Cut two of the smaller inside pattern on the tan copy paper. Cut two of the larger pattern on the brown felt. Lay the two felt pieces with the tips pointing toward each other. Paste the tan pieces inside the felt pieces centering the sides --- with the straight bottom lining up just like in the text box pg 3.

Cut a rectangle piece of felt large enough to cover the headband. Sew or paste it on the headband. Sewing it may be stronger.

When glue is dry, fold the ears together at the bottom and sew the bottom on the side of the headband low enough so that when the headband is on your head the ear will stand straight up. And as shown in the left picture, tack the side a bit up the band to keep the ear from flopping.

To make the ox horns:

A headband – get another thick one

Two empty paper towel rollers

Brown or tan packaging tape

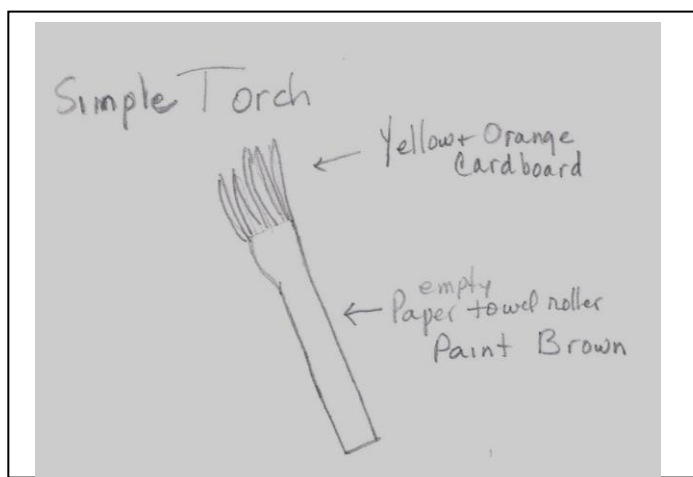
Twist the paper towel roller on one end so that it comes to a point and turns up. Wrap it with tape and then tape it to the headband. You can also wrap the headband with the tape if you wish.

To make the torches: I only made 4 SHINNY TORCHES, but if everyone makes their own torch or lantern or brings their own candle it would be easier.

Simple torchs: Use empty paper towel roller. Wrap the top with brown paper to make it larger and tape the paper on. Use yellow and orange cardboard and cut out individual flames. Paste the flames to the enlarged top of the roller.



### Shiny Torches:

Use empty paper towel rollers or longer round cardboard tubes that maps or calendars come in. Wrap old paper around the top to make it larger. Tape the paper on. Cover the top with tin foil and tape it on.

Get a shiny luminous red Christmasie gift bag. Cut out a piece to paste on the top. This material will also be used in the lantern.

Use poster board material to cut out the flames, pattern on pg 6, and paste tin fold to both sides. Paint lines like flames with a florescent orange water based decorative paint.

Paste the flame strip to the top of the torch. Cover up base of strip with tin foil. You can paint more lines of stripes on the tin foil ball top. Bend or cup each flame in and bend the tops toward the center as in picture.



### To make the lanterns:

Using the shiny, sparkly red gift bag, paste several pieces together so that both sides are the bright luminous sparkly red. When dry, cut out small pieces that will be put inside the lantern to shine like light.

Find a piece of silver poster board.

Cut out the bottom and the top patterns on the silver poster board.

The body: Cut out the body on the silver poster board. Paste tin foil on the whole inside. Cut out the windows. Paste saran wrap or a clear piece of plastic over the window part on the inside.

Bend the body around the bottom tightly so that the bottom bends inward at its center a bit. Tape the body together. Tape the bottom to the body best you can. If the size did not come out right adjust it.

Tape the straight edges of the top together. Place the red pieces inside the lantern. Then tape the top on.

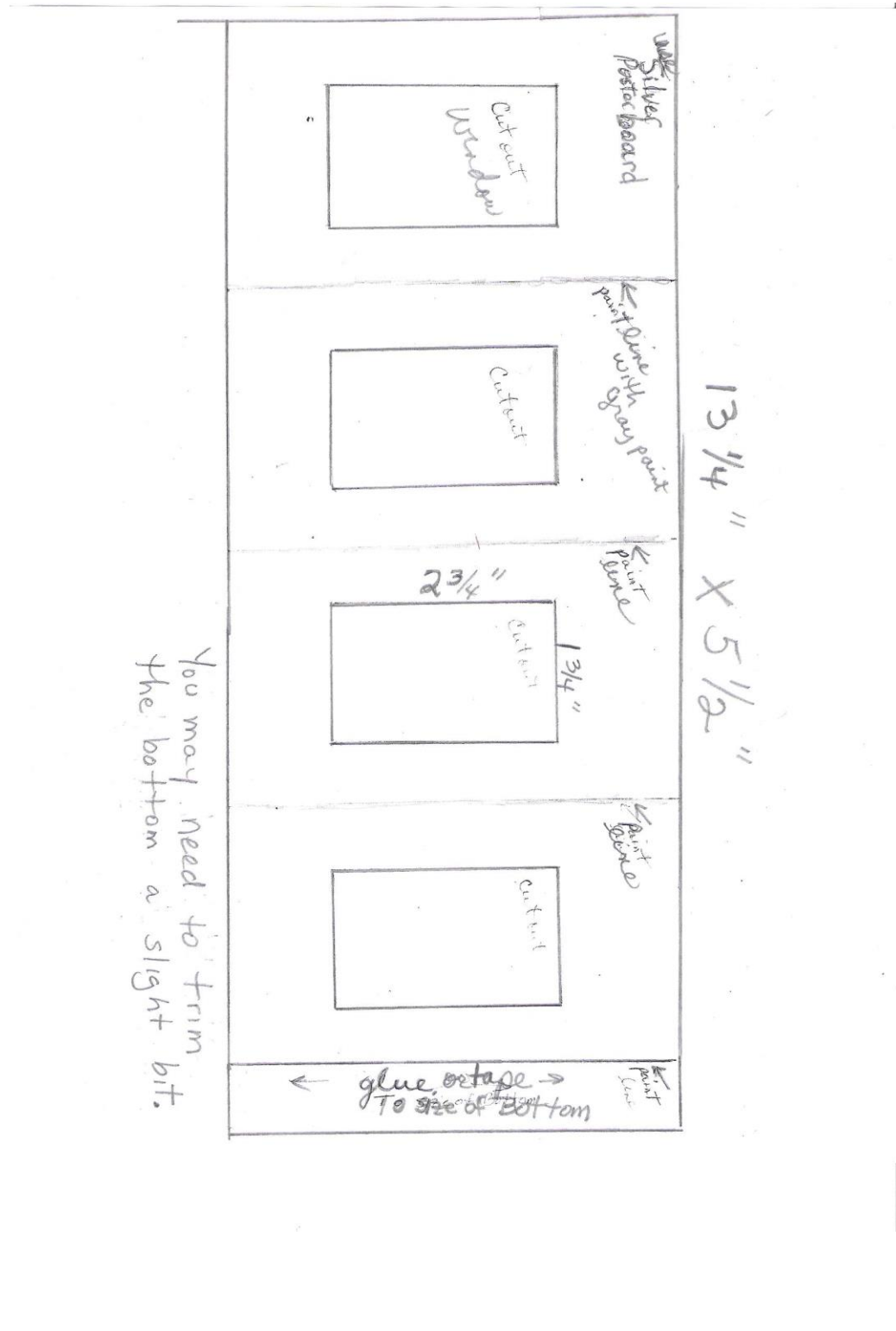
Cut a rectangle piece long enough so that it can be folded over to make a handle and wide enough to fold over so silver shows on both sides.

Cut a small round circle to put on the top. Staple the handle to the small round piece. Gently smash the point of the top down then glue the small round piece with handle to the top.

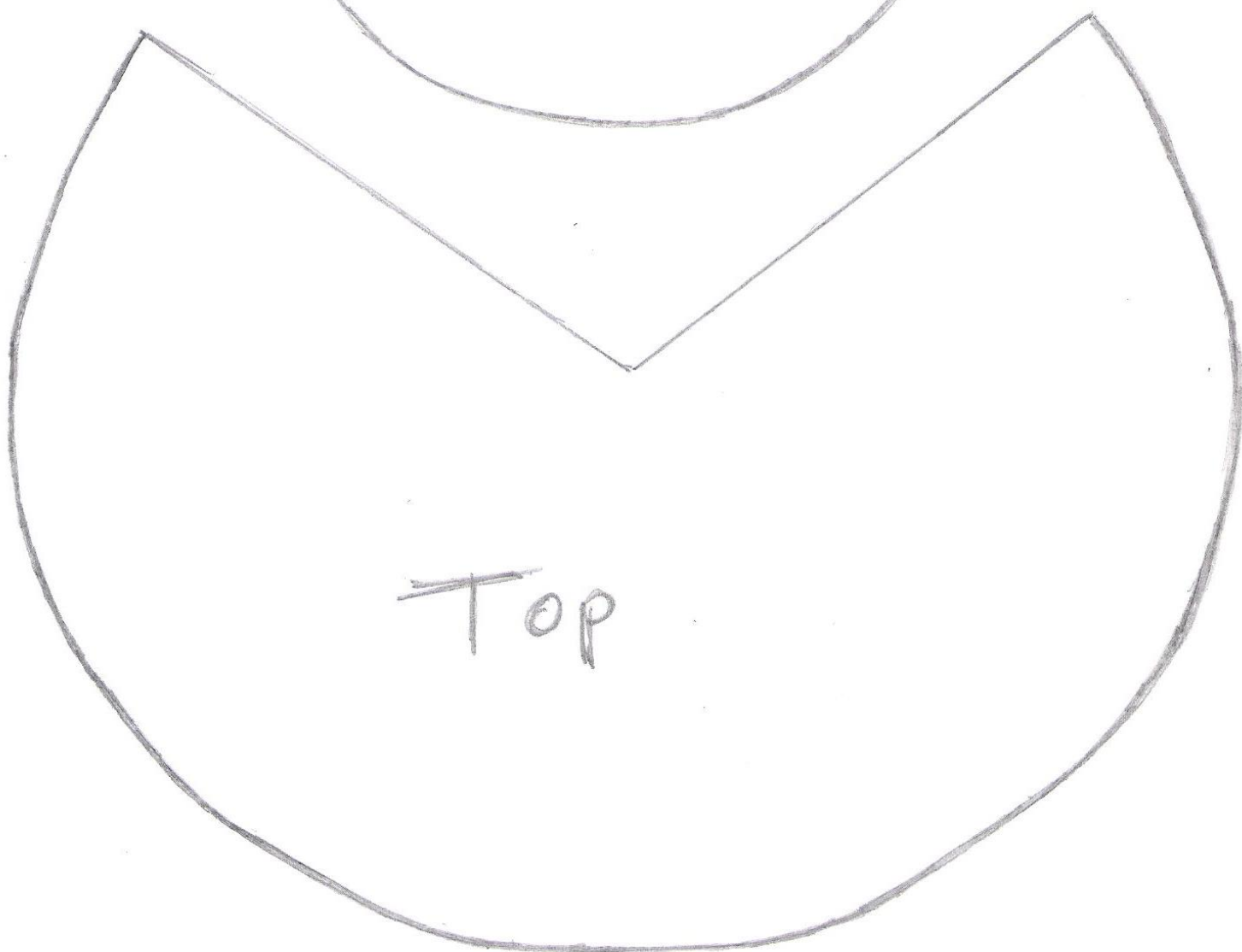
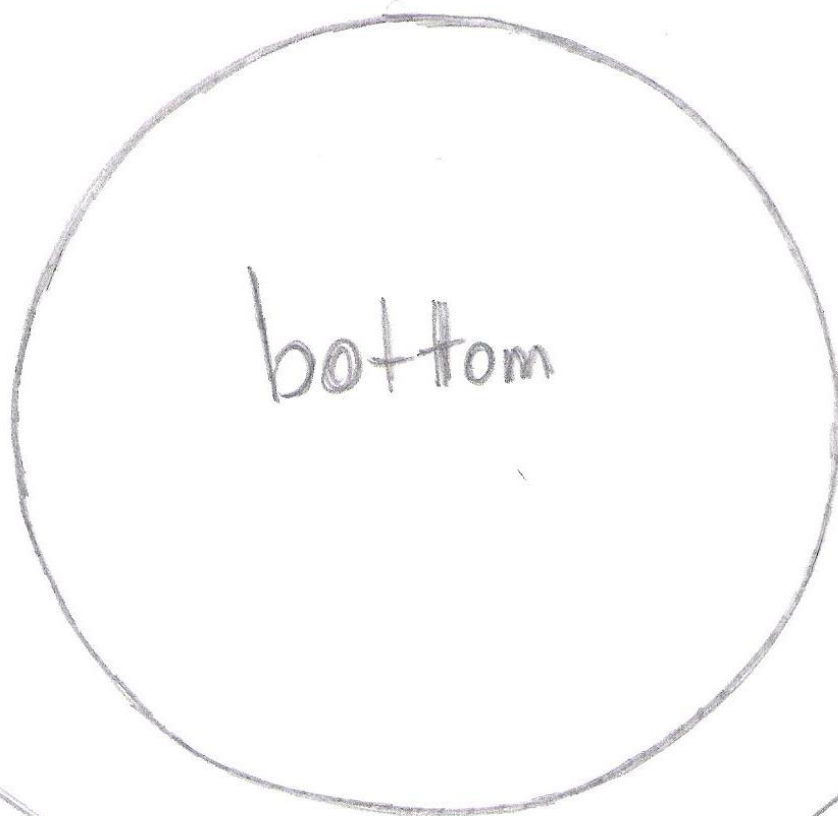




Pattern for **BODY** with dimensions (it would not fit on my printer so I reduced it here)

### To make a manger:

If you have a small manger from your nativity, use it.  
OR, you can use any small box. You can cover it with brown paper or paint it or just leave it. I found a cute little wooden crate-looking thing in my garage.

### Manger and Hay



To make the hay, one for each person present if possible:

Use tan copy paper and write or type a healing that could have happened from the hay upon which the Christ Child appeared in St. Francis first Christmas Crèche on that cold midnight in Greccio.

Place wadded up tan or green paper for filler in the manger if needed. Place the healing hay on top.

The Reader can be St. Francis or pick a person to do St. Francis.

When the Reader reads the vision of John of Greccio, the person who plays St. Francis goes to the manger and the person pretends to (when the Child Jesus appeared, no one saw the Child Jesus except John and St. Francis, so there is no figure in the our little manger) to awaken the baby Jesus and picks him up, and he hugs him then puts him back in the manger.

## PRAYER SERVICE

### **READER: PART I - from:**

Celano, First Life 86-87 from Omnibus  
(and "Christmas Crib" from Franciscan Friars T.O.R.)

St. Francis' highest intention, greatest desire, and supreme purpose was to observe the holy gospel in and through all things. He wanted to follow the doctrine and walk in the footsteps of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to do so perfectly, with all vigilance, all zeal, complete desire of the mind, complete fervor of the heart. He remembered Christ's words through constant meditation and recalled his actions through wise consideration. The humility of the incarnation and the love of the passion so occupied his memory that he scarcely wished to think of anything else. Hence what he did in the third year before the day of his glorious death, in the town called Greccio, 45 miles south of Assisi, on the birthday of our Lord Jesus Christ, should be reverently remembered.

There was in that place a certain man named John, of good reputation and even better life, whom the blessed Francis particularly loved. Noble and honorable in his own land, he had trodden on nobility of the flesh and pursued that of the mind. Around fifteen days before the birthday of Christ, Francis sent for this man, as he often did, and said to him, "If you wish to celebrate the approaching feast of the Lord at Greccio, hurry and do what I tell you. I want to do something that will recall the memory of that child who was born in Bethlehem, to see with bodily eyes the inconveniences of his infancy, how he lay in the manger, and how the ox and ass stood by." Upon hearing this, the good and faithful man hurried to prepare all that the holy man had requested.

The day of joy drew near, the time of exultation approached. The brothers were called from their various places. With glad hearts, the men and women of that place prepared, according to their means, candles and torches to light up that night which has illuminated all the days and years with its glittering star. Finally the holy man of God arrived and, finding everything prepared, saw it and rejoiced.

The manger is ready, hay is brought, the ox and ass are led in. Simplicity is honored there, poverty is exalted, humility is commended and a new Bethlehem, as it were, is made from Greccio.

## Catholic Prayer: Christmas Eve Prayer

### *Description:*

*This prayer from the Roman Martyrology is said by the family on Christmas Eve to celebrate Christ's birth, accompanied by the placement of the Christ Child in the crib in the home.*

### **Prayer:**

*From the Roman Martyrology:*

In the twenty-fourth day of the month of December;  
 In the year five-thousand one-hundred and ninety-nine from the creation of the world,  
 when in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth;  
 In the year two-thousand nine-hundred and fifty-seven from the flood;  
 In the year two-thousand and fifty-one from the birth of Abraham;  
 In the year one-thousand five-hundred and ten from the going forth of the people of Israel  
 out of Egypt under Moses;  
 In the year one-thousand and thirty-two from the anointing of David as king;  
 In the sixty-fifth week according to the prophecy of Daniel;  
 In the one-hundred and ninety-fourth Olympiad;  
 In the year seven-hundred and fifty-two from the foundation of the city of Rome;  
 In the forty-second year of the reign of the Emperor Octavian Augustus;  
 In the sixth age of the world, while the whole earth was at peace—

eternal God and the Son of the eternal Father, willing to consecrate the world by His  
 gracious coming, having been conceived of the Holy Spirit, and the nine months of His  
 conception being now accomplished, (*all kneel or bow*) was born in Bethlehem of Judah of  
 the Virgin Mary, made man. The birthday of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to the flesh.

**All:** Thanks be to God.

### **READER: PART II - from Celano, First Life and Christmas Crib**

Night is illuminated like the day, delighting men and beasts. The people come and  
 joyfully celebrate the new mystery. The forest resounds with voices and the rocks  
 respond to their rejoicing. The brothers sing, discharging their debt of praise to the  
 Lord, and the whole night echoes with jubilation. The holy man of God stands before  
 the manger full of sighs, consumed by devotion and filled with a marvelous joy. The  
 solemnities of the mass are performed over the manger and the priest experiences a  
 new consolation.

The holy man of God wears a deacon's vestments, for he was indeed a deacon, and he sings the holy gospel with a sonorous voice. And his voice, a sweet voice, a vehement voice, a clear voice, a sonorous voice, invites all to the highest rewards. Then he preaches mellifluously (melodiously) to the people standing about, telling them about the birth of the poor king and the little city of Bethlehem.

(... aglow with overflowing love for Him; and speaking the word Bethlehem, his voice was more like the bleating of sheep, his mouth was filled more with sweet affection than with words.)

Often, too, when he wished to mention Jesus Christ, burning with love he called him "the child of Bethlehem," and speaking the word "Bethlehem" or "Jesus," he licked his lips with his tongue, seeming to taste the sweetness of these words.

The gifts of the Almighty are multiplied here and a marvelous vision is seen by a certain virtuous man, John. For he saw a little child lying lifeless in the manger and he saw the holy man of God approach and arouse the child as if from a deep sleep. Nor was this an unfitting vision, for in the hearts of many the child Jesus really had been forgotten, but now, by his grace and through his servant Francis, he had been brought back to life and impressed here by loving recollection.

**Prayer All:** This day Christ is born; this day the Savior hath appeared; this day angels are singing on earth, archangels are rejoicing. This day the just are glad and say, Glory to God in high heaven, alleluia.

**All:** *(All pray Psalm 110, one of the great Messianic psalms.)*

THE LORD says to my lord:

Rule in the midst of your foes!

3 Your people will offer themselves freely

on the day you lead your host upon the holy mountains. will come to you.

he will shatter kings on the day of his wrath.

### **Gospel of Luke 2:1-14**

IN those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be enrolled. 2 This was the first enrollment, when Quirinius was governor of Syria. 3 And all went to be enrolled, each to his own city. 4 And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the city of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, 5 to be enrolled with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. 6 And while they were there, the time came for her to be delivered. 7 And she gave birth to her first-born son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

8 And in that region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. 9 And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with fear. 10 And the angel said to them, "Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people; 11 for to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. 12 And this will be a sign for you: you will find a babe wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." 13 And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, 14 "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom he is pleased!"

**All:** Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to men of good will. We praise Thee. We bless Thee. We adore Thee. We glorify Thee. We give Thee thanks for Thy great glory, O Lord God, heavenly King, God the Father Almighty.

O Lord, the Only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ. O Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father. Thou who takest away the sins of the world, have mercy on us. Thou who sittest at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For Thou only art holy. Thou only art the Lord. Thou only Jesus Christ, art most high.

With the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

**Father:** O Lord, hear my prayer.

**All:** And let my cry come to You.

**Father:** Let us pray. O God, who made this most holy night to shine forth with the brightness of the true Light, grant we beseech Thee, that we who have known the mystery of His light on earth, may attain the enjoyment of His happiness in heaven. Who lives and reigns with Thee forever and ever

**READER: PART III - Celano, First Life and Christmas Crib**

Finally the celebration ended and each returned joyfully home.

The hay placed in the manger was kept so that the Lord, multiplying his holy mercy, might bring health to the beasts of burden and other animals. And indeed it happened that many animals throughout the surrounding area were cured of their illnesses by eating this hay. Moreover, women undergoing a long and difficult labor gave birth safely when some of this hay was placed upon them. And a large number of people, male and female alike, with various illnesses, all received the health they desired there. At last a temple of the Lord was consecrated where the manger stood, and over the manger an altar was constructed and a church dedicated in honor of the blessed father Francis, so that, where animals once had eaten hay, henceforth men could gain health in soul and body by eating the flesh of the Lamb without spot or blemish, Jesus Christ our Lord, who through great and indescribable love gave himself to us, living and reigning with the Father and Holy Spirit, God eternally glorious forever and ever, Amen. Alleluia! Alleluia!
